- **3.** Promoting and supporting human **flourishing** across all frontiers, and championing **human rights** for everyone



Your values are what you see as important and serve as guiding principles in your life.

Humanism is a philosophy or a way of thinking about the world.

Humanism is a set of ethics or ideas about how people should live and act.

Humanist teaching stresses the importance of 'living a good life'.

The Golden rule ,treat others the way you would like to be treated, is shared by Humanism and Christians.

Your worldview is your ideas about life;

the foundation that your beliefs, actions, decisions and opinions are based on.

Your influences affect your worldview.

The Ten Commandments are a fundamental set of rules for Christians and Jews.

The Fall: Christians believe when Adam and Eve disobeyed God, they 'fell' from perfection and brought evil into a perfect world
